### Teacher Talk with Mrs. Dyrland

#### Learning Beyond the Walls of West Country Outreach

Our school district has worked hard to offer students an opportunity to attend “College” while still in High School. Through the work of our District Dual Credit and Pathways Coordinator, Kylie Kissel, Wolf Creek Public students have access to more than 50 courses. The students, in consultation with Kylie and me, can register in courses in which they would receive both High School and College credits. Students have the choice of courses offered from Red Deer Polytechnic (RDP), SAIT, Athabasca University and Olds College. The second semester courses for this year for Olds College include Animal Health Technology, Hospitality and Tourism Management, Horticulture Technologist, Land and Water Resources, Agriculture Techgronomy, Business Management. RDP is offering courses in Medical Terminology, Psychology and Microsoft Azure while Athabasca University offers many options in various specialties like Business, Psychology, Education, Nursing, Computers, Gender Studies, Engineering and Health Care. One of the exciting additions to our Dual **Credit program** is access to the nine **Apprenticeship Technical Training and Pre- Employment** courses. Students can start their career in trades like Cook, Automotive Mechanic, Heavy Duty Mechanic, Carpentry, Electrician, Pipe Trades, Welder or Agriculture Equipment Technician. These have various start and end dates, but all allow the student to gain full credit in the first year of these trades.

Students can access these courses in any grade, or even come back after graduation to start their post-secondary journey in a safe and caring environment. There is no cost to the students to access these courses and they will have the support of the district as they transition to college.




